The European Union: Challenges and Strategic Choices

## **Course Description**

With 28 (27?) member states and nearly half a billion residents, the European Union has grown into a major political and economic actor on the world stage. It has promoted peace in Europe for over five decades, changed the way Europeans live, as well as the way the rest of the world perceives Europe. The EU has been considered a paradigm of a successful "peace project" that promoted stability, prosperity and successful cooperation between erstwhile feuding nations. The fact that the Union had grown from its original 6 members to 28 served as undeniable proof of the appeal and attractiveness of the EU for most countries on the European continent.

The past few years have changed this idyllic picture of the European Union, and the EU is currently facing one of the <u>most difficult and challenging periods</u> since its creation. The unprecedented turmoil and uncertainty following the United Kingdom's shock decision to leave the EU in June 2016, the extent and intensity of the ongoing economic crisis in the eurozone, the rise of eurosceptism, populism and extremism in Europe, the impact of the refugee crisis, the fear of terrorism and the uncertainty surrounding current relations with Russia and the United States have all created an increasingly volatile and insecure environment concerning the future of the EU.

### **Learning Objectives**

The <u>goals</u> of the course are to acquire knowledge of the history, institutions, politics and economics of the European Union, and to understand the complex new realities and challenges that are threatening to undermine decades of economic integration and political cooperation on the continent. Specifically, through a combination of lectures, critical analysis in class discussions, and students' written work/ independent research, the course will focus on:

- History of European integration (ECSC, stimulus for creation of EEC, early enlargements)
- How does the EU work, and what impact has it had on the lives of Europeans?
- Institutions and decision-making processes in the EU (Commission, Council of Ministers, European Parliament, European Court of Justice)
- Economic and Monetary Union, Single Market, Foreign and Security Policies
- EU Enlargement: a history; current issues and on-going negotiations;
- The eurozone crisis: background, responses and impact throughout Europe;
- The future of the EU: dealing with the new challenges of an increasingly unpredictable environment, including Brexit, eurosceptism, refugee crisis, terrorism, relations with the US and Russia.

### Course Requirements/ Assessment

Students should come to class prepared on the basis of the assigned readings per lecture, and class participation is considered essential. There will also be a midterm exam, a final exam, and group presentations in the last sessions of the course. The breakdown of the final grade for this course is as follows:

- Mid-term examination (30% of final grade);
- Class participation (20% of final grade);
- In-class presentation (20% of final grade);
- Final examination (30% of final grade).
